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One Great Hour of Sharing and Humanitarian Relief for Ukraine

Each Easter Claremont Presbyterian Church participates in One Great Hour of Sharing. For over 70 years, One Great Hour of Sharing has provided Presbyterians a way to share God's love with our neighbors in need around the world. The three programs supported by One Great Hour of Sharing - Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, the Presbyterian Hunger Program, and Self-Development of People - all work in different ways to serve individuals and communities in need. From initial disaster response to ongoing community development, their work fits together to provide people with safety, sustenance, and hope.

During this time of crisis in Ukraine, Presbyterian Disaster Assistance is actively reaching out to our partners in the region to provide humanitarian assistance. Mission Agency and PDA staff reported in March:

"We are grateful for the outpouring of prayers and calls from congregations and individuals asking how they can help. As the violence continues, the number of people being displaced internally and fleeing to neighboring countries increases by the day. And in the midst of the chaos, there are sibling churches and ecumenical partners who are already providing assistance with basic items for survival. Our first priority as PDA is to provide funding to these partners on the ground. While the scale of this crisis is new, receiving refugees from Ukraine and oth-

Fill the Red Wheelbarrow... and more

As a continuation of CPC's red wheelbarrow project and our ongoing support for Inland Valley Hope Partners, the Board of Deacons will be sponsoring a personal hygiene drive to benefit Inland Valley Hope Partners as part of Sunday worship and coffee hour on May 1.

Any personal hygiene products of any size (travel, personal, or family) are welcome and may be dropped off on the patio before or after worship. Small items will be packaged into individual hygiene bags to offer to the unhoused. All other items will be available to support regular clients of IVHP, which is still experiencing a significant increase in need over past years.

Suggested items for donation include soap, shampoo, lotion, tooth-paste, deodorant, shaving cream, hand sanitizer, and lip balm, along with razors, toilet paper, Kleenex, tampons, toothbrushes, dental floss, combs, hair brushes, Band-Aides, etc. Also welcome are basic cleaning supplies such as dish soap, laundry detergent, dishwashing detergent, bleach wipes, and paper towels. We also welcome your collection of individually packaged utensils. No diapers or formula please. Diapers and formula are supported by an ongoing program and are not a specific need at this time.

If you are not able to attend in person worship on May 1 and would still like to participate, donations may be dropped off in the red wheelbarrow in the Narthax any time before the drive or in the church office during regular office hours between now and Sunday, May 1. Grief and Trauma Workshop Series

Questions we often ask ourselves include, How do I process this moment? Where do I process it? With whom do I process it? Rev. Covid Protocol Updates for Church Events

With the winter Omicron surge waning, the LA County Department of Public Health issued a new Health Officer Order on March 4th which lifted some COVID safety restrictions. At its March meeting, the Claremont Presbyterian Church Session took these changes into consideration and updated our current protocols. This update moves us toward a return to some of our pre-COVID practices, while maintaining certain safety practices that protect young children who cannot be vaccinated as well as our vulnerable seniors and those with immune-compromising health issues.

Masks: At its recent briefing for Faith Communities, representatives of the LA County Health Department expressed concern that the emergence of the BA2 Omicron variant combined with Spring Break travel season could mean an increase in LA County's infection rates in the coming weeks. They stated that continuing to wear masks at indoor gatherings is one way to keep such a potential surge in check. Therefore, Session voted to continue to require masks for all indoor church events at this time. Session will revisit the indoor mask requirement at its April 27 meeting.

In April we will work toward moving the hymnals and friendship pads back into the pews, we will phase out the sign in process for those attending Sunday worship, and we will allow food to be served at indoor events as long as current Health Department guidelines and best practices are applied.

Thank you to all of you for working together to move ahead with care and safety for all.
