Our Next Most Faithful Step

I just completed my final course in the Certificate in Church Planting & Revitalization program. Our cohort decided it would be best for this class to meet six consecutive Wednesdays for three hours each since we would need to meet online as opposed to the usual traveling to the seminary. We ended our class sessions with a brief yet meaningful ritual. We would go around the Zoom "Brady Bunch" screens and each complete the following statement, "My next most faithful step will be..."

There was no expectation on how grand or small a next step was deemed to be. Our response simply needed to be authentic to each of us. For some it was the act of getting more sleep, and for others it was mending a fractured relationship. The act of stating a next step and calling it faithful invited each of us to more seriously commit to its completion. In the first couple of weeks I shared steps like completing my assignment, but at the last session I stated, "my next most faithful step will be to have more conversations with others."

I have always spent more energy and time on trying to produce something so I can have something tangible to show for my effort. It often meant that I would all too quickly race past opportunities to sit with and learn more about the people in my life. Stating that I would have more conversations with people is a faithful step to shifting the way I engage with and value the person in front of me.

As a congregation we have taken many faithful steps over the last fifteen months. Recently we took the faithful step to worship in-person and indoors, and then to enhance our technology for live-streaming services. In the next month or two we will begin the next faithful step towards gathering for in-person activities and programs.

We are learning how to once again be present with each other in new ways.

New on the needs list this year include Washi tape for student book publishing and ear buds. One class asked for old buttons and googly eyes, and another class asked for peat pots with Miracle Grow potting soil and seeds for lettuce, Scarlet Runner, beans, and radishes. Camino De San Diego - Journeying toward Justice

A virtual pilgrimage along & across the US-Mexico Border

In this unprecedented time, Via International and the SoCal Presbyterian Immigrant Accompaniment Ministry are partnering to build relationships of mutual support with local leaders along the U.S.-Mexico border. Co-hosting the experience will be leaders of The Border Church / La Iglesia Fronteriza , a bi-national community of faith dedicated to accompanying the migrant people of God at Friendship Park, the historic bi-national meeting place at the westernmost end of the border.

The Camino de San Diego will offer participants the opportunity to learn from borderlands leaders engaged in "journeys toward justice" in San Diego and Tijuana. These leaders will serve as hosts and guides, sharing their spiritual journeys and their practices of working for justice at the grassroots. Participants will be encouraged and inspired to celebrate their own journeys toward justice.

The Camino de San Diego consists of six parts:

An Orientation will introduce participants to enduring themes — including colonization, white racism & nationalism that have given shape to the cultural context of the U.S.-Mexico borderlands. The orientation will be hosted by Rev. John Fanestil (Ph.D. in History, USC) and leaders from the Via International and Border Church communities.

Three Immersive Site Visits will introduce participants to local leaders working for justice at three landmark locations in the California/Baja California borderlands:

- Chicano Park, where the journeys of "chicanos" and "fronterizos" will be explored;
- La Plaza El Chaparral, where participants will meet "migrants" and "asylum-seekers";
- Friendship Park, where "deportees" and "mixed-status families" will be foregrounded.

The Border Church / La Iglesia Fronteriza - Join this unique bi-national community of faith for a 3O-minute "virtual hike" (informal conversation), followed by a 3O-minute celebration of communion with friends from both the United States and Mexico.

A Closing Retreat gives participants an extended opportunity to explore their place within "the migrant people of God," to embrace their own journeys toward justice, and to identify ways to live out their own callings in their home contexts and communities.

Save the Date: Fall Retreat

On September 19 from 1:00 - 2:30 PM, CPC will host a Fall Equinox Labyrinth Retreat and Workshop. Our guest presenter is Dr. Rebecca Prichard. Dr. Prichard has taught theology, worship, and spirituality in a variety of congregational and academic settings. A 2007 Lilly sponsored sabbatical drew her more deeply into the study of Celtic history, art, and spirituality. Rebecca has traveled widely through the British Isles, having lived and worked in Scotland. A calligrapher, she draws upon the words and artistry of the Celtic Gospel books as prayerful practice. Campus Safety Protocols Modified

On June 15, the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health issued a new directive lifting many COVID-related safety mandates and replacing them with guidance on best practices. On June 23, session approved these new guidelines.

The Health Department continues to strongly encourage masks for large indoor gatherings where not everyone is vaccinated. We also want to ensure that children, (who cannot yet receive vaccinations) and their families feel safe and welcome in worship. Therefore we will continue to ask those attending worship in our sanctuary to wear masks at this time.

- 1. Because we are masking, WE CAN SING!
- 2. To assist in containing any spread of new variants of the virus, we will continue to check in worshipers in case contact tracing is needed.
- 3. We will continue to seat worshipers in alternate pews for the time being.
- 4. We will continue to maintain a low touch environment, including receiving our offering in boxes in the narthex following worship, and using pre-sealed cups for communion.

Please Lift Up Your Prayers


