# Curious, Creative, Compassionate

You all know me well enough by now to know that I am in no way an athlete. However, my husband was a cross country runner in high school and college and my brother was a competitive swimmer all through our childhood and teen years--so I know something about athletes by association. One thing I've learned about both running and swimming is that there is a big difference between sprints, middle-distance, and long distance events. Each requires a different kind of training, pacing, and mental preparation; and very few athletes are good at all three.

As we enter our seventh month of COVID-19 restrictions, I look back and see that we have had to re-envision several times what kind of race we are running. Back in March we thought we were preparing for a sprint: intense effort for a very brief time. Then in the summer months we shifted our thinking as if we were in a middle distance event where one hits a plateau speed that they can maintain for a longer period, anticipating a kick of energy at the end to cross the finish line. Now it's becoming clearer that we are, in fact, in a marathon. Long distance events require incredible reserves of strength and stamina as well as the proper fuel to keep going. It's no mistake that this type of event is sometimes referred to as "endurance running."

What can fuel us for this test of endurance? What can help us go the distance? I think we need to be sustained in these times by a faith that is

#### World Communion Sunday 2020

While we will miss our annual gathering with Emmanuel Hispanic Presbyterian Church and GPIB Indonesian Fellowship on World Communion Sunday, San Gabriel Presbytery is working on plans for creative and inspiring service that will bring together the congregations of the Presbytery.

The Presbytery staff and leaders are creating a series of videos for each element of the worship service: call to worship, prayer of confession, Scripture reading, sermon, and Communion.

The videos will feature members of our Presbytery, Presbytery staff, Presbyterian Mission Agency and Office of General Assembly staff, and mission co-workers. These videos will be in a variety of languages and subtitled in English. Claremont Presbyterian Church has contributed some of our virtual choir pieces and Pastor Karen will be offering the Benediction. We plan to use many of the videos developed by Presbytery in our 10 AM service on World Communion Sunday, October 4. This service will be live streaned on our CPC Facebook Page.

Also on World Communion Sunday we will receive our annual Peacemaking Offering. Three-fourths of that offering goes to support the PCUSA's global peacemaking work and 1/4 stays with us to assist our own peacemaking efforts. This year, our portion will go to continue to support relief efforts to those impacted by the explosion in Beirut last August.

noon at UCC. Thanks for your participation. Any questions please call Barbara Patch. 624-5767


## Thanks from Mountain View Elementary School

Many have desired an opportunity to discuss the sermon in a casual setting with others, and this is a new way of doing just this.

On Saturday, October 10 at 5 PM on Zoom, Evangelism & Nurture invites you to a virtual Pass the Salt gathering around the tradition of a recipe exchange. Below you will find the simple recipe for Chicken Salad. Give yourself some time before the gathering to prepare the dish, adding your own ingredient to zhuzh it up with your own flare if you would like. We will spend some time sharing how we liked the dish and what we may have done to zhuzh it up. And then the remainder of the hour we will share in conversation about the September sermon series: "What the Poets Saw: a look at the Psalms."

Here is the recipe - Mt. Sac. Chicken Salad

1 quart chopped cooked chicken
 1 pint chopped celery
 2 small can chopped black olives

1/2 cup chopped onion 2 cups seedless grapes

Mix all of above ingredients in a large bowl and then add the following dressing, mixing well:

1/4 bottle Catalina Salad Dressing

1 Tablespoon mustard

2 teaspoons sugar

Cover and refrigerate. Just before serving add:

1 regular size can of chow mien noodles.
