Rev. Dr. James Lee to preach for World Communion Sunday

The Rev. Dr. James Lee will be our guest preacher for World Communion Sunday. Dr. Lee is president of International Theological Seminary in West Covina. Prior to assuming the presidency, Dr. Lee was resident professor of Old Testament at ITS. President Lee's commitment to global minis-



try grew early on when he traveled to churches in Guatemala, Mexico, Colombia, and Russia as a high school student. He considers his role as president, his scholarly inquiry, and teaching ministry as extensions of a deep and abiding desire to be a part of God's redemptive work in the world.

President Lee earned his Ph.D. in Old Testament from Union Presbyterian Seminary. He received his M. Div. from Princeton Theological Seminary and a B.A. in Philosophy from University of Texas at Austin.

Ordained to the ministry of Word and Sacrament in the Presbyterian Church (USA), President Lee served congregations in New Jersey, Richmond, and Dallas. He enjoys teaching the Bible in cross-cultural contexts, most recently having taught in India, Rwanda, Indonesia and Nigeria.

Local Legends: A Fall Concert Series

Claremont is full of talented musicians. In October we will celebrate several of our local legends with events on our new outdoor stage.

Saturday, October 8, 5 PM The Citrus Sisters — Ellen Harper, Elizabeth Hangan and Marguerite Millard — are based in Southern California and have been playing music together in a variety of formats for many years. Ellen Harper is a singer, songwriter, musician and author and is co-owner of the Folk Music Center in Claremont. Elizabeth Hangan is a singer, songwriter, bass player and music educator based in Southern California. Marguerite Millard has played with a variety of musical groups in the Bay Area and in Southern California. Her group Squeakin' Wheels performs frequently around Claremont—including a concert on our outdoor stage last July.

Saturday, October 22, 5 PM John York is a bass player, guitarist, and songwriter currently based in Claremont. His musical gifts have led him to collaborations with leading lights of the musical world, including time as part of the well known folk rock group, The Byrds. John attended

one of the summer concerts on our new outdoor stage and loved the space and the spirit of the venue. He is looking forward to sharing his vocal and instrumental talents with Claremont on our front lawn.

These concerts are free of charge and open to the public.

Biblical Storytelling Workshop and **Story Concert**

Pastor Karen Sapio is working on her Certificate in Biblical Storytelling through the Network of Biblical Storytellers International. In partial fulfillment of the Certificate Requirements, she will be presenting a Bible Storytelling Workshop on October 16 from 4:30-6:00 in Room 1 and a Storytelling Concert that same evening at 7 PM. Adult Ed – What's Coming Up?

"Navigating the Midterm Elections" is the topic of a non-partisan conversation to be held prior to Worship on Sunday, October 23 at 8:45 AM in Room 1 or on Zoom, meeting ID 843 4386 4106. David Menefee-Libey will facilitate our discussion, as he has for many election seasons, and assist us in identifying significant issues. Menefee-Libey is the William A. Johnson Professor of Government, professor of politics, and coordinator of public policy analysis at Pomona College where he has taught since 1989. He is a six-time winner of the college's Wig Distinguished Teaching Award, and describes his recent teaching emphasis as "the challenges of building and sustaining liberal democracy and the rule of law in the United States amid political polarization, and large and growing economic inequity." His research interests include the politics of elementary and secondary education reform, and civic education. His engagement in community life includes being a long-time member of CPC.

A three-part series on "Indigenous Peoples and Realities in Southern California" will be included in CPCs Advent programming. Participants will engage in exploring Indigenous issues including racism, belonging, and relationships with the church. Announcements about presenters and details regarding program resources will be forthcoming.


Upcoming Deacon Events

Peacemaking Offering Received on World Communion Sunday

Once again, Claremont Presbyterian Church will participate in the PCUSA's Peacemaking and Global Witness Offering on World Communion Sunday. A gift to the Peace & Global Witness Offering enables the church to promote the Peace of Christ by addressing systems of conflict and injustice across the world. Individual congregations are encouraged to utilize up to 25% of this offering to connect with the global witness of Christ's peace. Mid-councils retain an additional 25% for ministries of peace and reconciliation. The remaining 50% is used by the Presbyterian Mission Agency to advocate for peace and justice in cultures of violence, including our own, through collaborative projects of education and Christian witness. This year, our local percentage of the offering will go the support Inland Valley Hope Partner's efforts to address the growing problem of local food insecurity.
