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The Church Has Left the Building! Mission in the time of COVID-19

Our campus has been shut down for the past three months, but our mission has continued! Throughout this time, our congregation has been actively involved with our local and global mission partners to serve the needs of our community and our world.

Food Drive for Inland Valley Hope Partners

On Saturday, May 23, our Deacons hosted a Drive Up/Drop Off food drive in the church parking lot. During the three hours of the drive, a steady stream of cars dropped off close to 5,000 pounds of food, hygiene products, and cleaning supplies. In addition, a number of drivers also left checks for financial contributions to IVHP's food banks and family shelter.

Tijuana Water Project/Centro Pedagogic Didaque

Our Living Waters for the World Team has been working with Centro Pedagogic Didaque in Tijuana (a school for children with disabilities) to install a clean water system for their students and teachers. The project was delayed as schools in Mexico, as here in the U.S., were shut down in March due to COVID-19. The school's teachers are not covered by unemployment insurance, so they faced a serious crisis. Claremont Presbyterian Church and First Presbyterian Church in San Bernadino worked together to address this need, contributing a combined \$2685 to cover teachers' salaries for two weeks. CPC members Octavio Guerro and Sam Atwood crossed the border to hand deliver the funds to ensure that the teachers would receive them in a timely manner.

Syria/Lebanon Mission Partners

The refugee schools and refugee relief efforts that CPC has long supported in this region found themselves facing the added challenge of responding to the impact of the COVID-19 crisis in the region. PCUSA Mission Co-Workers, Scott and Elmarie Parker, have provided updates on this work. Scott continues in Beirut, while Elmarie was in the U.S. when the outbreak began and was not able to return to the region as travel restrictions were imposed. Both the Mission Interpretation Commission and the Refugee Concerns Team have responded to their needs by

Uncommon Good Urban Agriculture

The garden installed on our berm and behind the Fellowship Hall has continued to produce much needed food for our mission partners at Uncommon Good. Much of this food has gone to the families they work with in their mentoring project, many of whom have lost jobs and income during the COVID-19 crisis. The rest has enabled Uncommon Good to continue to sell fresh produce to our community--even as grocery stores ran short.

One Great Hour of Sharing

We did not worship in person on Easter, yet our annual offering for the One Great Hour of Sharing still came in strong. To date, we have received \$1460 through the church office. This does not include offerings that some sent directly to the PCUSA denominational office. It also does not include the coins still in the Fish Banks remaining in our homes. We look forward to receiving those when we are able to worship in person.

In addition, the Mission Commission has contributed \$1000 each from funds designated for local mission to: CLASP, UnCommon Good, House of Ruth, Crossroads, CHAP, and Inland Valley Hope Partners.

Thanks to all of you! Your generosity has resulted in NO shut down in Mission for our church amidst the challenges of the last few months.

Session Approves Reopening Plan for Claremont Presbyterian Children's Center

At a special meeting on June 11, Claremont Presbyterian Church's Session voted to approve plans for re-opening the Claremont Presbyterian Children's Center on July 1. The plan was developed by a Reopening Feasibility Task Force consisting of Associate Pastor Brian Gaeta-Symonds, Center Director Sacha Lord, Children's Center Board member Barbara Mackenzie, Property and Finance Commission member Stuart Lillich, and Gabrielle Rodriguez who is a CPCC parent, a church member, and a nurse at Children's Hospital in Los Angeles. Their plan included details for how the Center would comply with Los Angeles County Department of Public Health and State Licensing protocols for operating Child Care facilities during the COVID-19 outbreak. These protocols include self-contained classrooms of no more than 10 children, frequent sanitizing of all areas throughout the day, frequent hand-washing schedules for staff and children, temperature screenings upon arrival at school each day, and required masks and aprons for staff. Guidelines also encourage moving activities outside as much as possible.

Before the shut-down in mid March, CPCC had over 100 children enrolled in seven classrooms. When the Center re-opens in July, we anticipate welcoming 20-30 children in four classrooms. Center Director Sacha Lord reports that a survey of CPCC parents conducted in late May indicates that more families plan to enroll their children in August and September. Even so, it will be quite some time until the Center is at full capacity. Much remains unknown—including the scale of the virus outbreak in coming months and decisions locally regarding reopening of the public schools.

Please hold our Children's Center, our Director, our teachers and our CPCC families in your prayers. We believe we are providing a much needed service to our community as parents are called back to work, and children need loving care and community after several months of isolation.
