# From the Pastor


Our Lenten group Bible study began last month with a discussion of the role that time in the wilderness plays in transformation.

The first Bible passage we explored together was the story of the Hebrew people's escape from oppression in Egypt. Their dramatic liberation from their old life was followed NOT by an immediate entry into the land of promise, but by forty years in the wilderness. Our Bible study guide quoted Alan Roxburgh's thoughts on this strange journey. He wrote: They spent forty years in the wilderness not because it took God forty years to get the Hebrew people out of Egypt. It took that long because it took forty years to get Egypt out of the Hebrew people.

When we are longing for transformation – either as individuals or as a community – we may wish that the journey from our old ways to a new life were easy, quick and painless. Most of the time, however, a step away from entrenched habits, traditions and ways of behaving is followed by some time in the wilderness; time in which we are trying to find our way, trying to unlearn long-standing patterns, trying to discern how we can become the people God is calling us to be.

This Lent, our lectionary readings in worship include the stories of people who encounter Jesus and experience a call to change their lives. You may notice that as each story ends, the person's journey toward transformation is just beginning. It is the same with Jesus' followers on Easter. The experience of resurrection calls those Easter morning witnesses to a complete transformation of their lives and their community. But as the gospel's Easter stories conclude, the transformation has just begun.

As we observe Lent and celebrate Easter this month, consider whether you – or we – are being called to step into the wilderness as part of God's work of transformation in us.

## **Godly Play**

In April we continue our Lenten series "The Faces of Easter," through Palm Sunday. There will be no Godly Play on Easter Sunday (April 20th), as our worship schedule will be different on this day.

On the last Sunday in April we begin a new series of lessons that take us from Easter Sunday to Pentecost. This series is entitled, "Knowing Jesus in a New Way." Each of these stories helps us to focus on the different ways we encounter the living Christ, and our first lesson in the series is "Knowing Jesus in a New Way: Known in Absence." In this lesson, the children will be asked to focus on the experience of finding the empty tomb.

#### People in the Church: Faith Jones

Sometimes I feel a bit guilty not being more Pentecostal," confesses Faith Jones. One might say it's in her blood, from the very beginning. Struck by the evangelical fervor typical of the Pentecostal movement, her parents in the 1930's joined the newly created Go Ye Fellowship in Southern California and became missionaries to southwest China. Faith was born there, as was her sister Anna two years later. Before WW II began Faith's mother returned with her two daughters to their home in Cardiff, Wales, to look after her mother, who had suffered a stroke, and a sister with asthma.

"When I was about ten a great sense of sin came on me," Faith recalled. With her mother beside her, Faith knelt at her bedside and asked Christ to save her. "I felt a great relief." Two years later she was able to receive baptism by total immersion. "It was a most wonderful experience," she said, because it was her first really public witness to the importance of God in her life.

In Cardiff the family attended the Elim Pentecostal Church. Faith saw the power of the Holy Spirit on many occasions as the Pentecostal church practiced spiritual healing and speaking in tongues. She recalled one instance when a woman in the congregation worshipped God by speaking in tongues. "It's important," she noted, "that someone serve as an interpreter," but in this particular instance no one understood what she was saying. Finally a visiting sailor exclaimed, "She's speaking Swedish!"

"In the Bible," Faith recalled, "Paul says that you have gifts. It's up to you to use those gifts." When Faith was 18 her mother seemed to follow that advice, embarking on a preaching tour of America. "She was a well-sought after preacher," Faith said, "while Anna and I sang duets. I loved that!" Her favorite song, then and now, is the Pentecostal hymn, "Follow, Follow, I Will Follow Jesus."

They traveled throughout America. In Chicago they appeared on "Welcome Travelers," a TV program that encouraged visitors to tell their story. The president of Wheaton College, Illinois, gave Faith and Anna each an envelope. Faith eagerly opened the envelope and found it contained \$100. It was the key to attend Wheaton. Faith went to work in a factory, saved enough to pay for one semester of college, and enrolled at Wheaton. Thereafter, small amounts of money would simply appear anonymously in her mailbox, allowing Faith to continue at Wheaton. Recalling her amazing experience, Faith exclaimed, "The Lord does provide! God is with us! Have faith!"

During the next decade Faith became a Registered Nurse, practiced midwifery and obstetrics in London and Wales, hitchhiked across Europe several times with friends, and returned to Chicago where she took a position at the Cook County Hospital. Conditions at the hospital "were very rough," Faith said, which was probably an understatement, yet it appealed to her as a "mission field" where her gifts could be put to great use. Continuing her education, she received a Master's degree in Counseling and found employment with

the Chicago Board of Education as a nurse visiting pregnant students. Many of these students were lost souls mired in terrible living conditions. For Faith it was another "mission field" and she continued there for nine years. During her Chicago years Faith gained spiritual strength while attending the Fourth Presbyterian Church whose pastor, a Welshman, the Rev. Dr. Elam Davies, was "the finest preacher I ever heard."

Eventually with an earned doctorate Faith accepted university teaching positions, first at the University of Illinois and later at Rush University. In 1984 her Dean at Rush University recommended Faith for a position at Cumberland College of Health Sciences (now a part of the University of Sydney) in Australia. The college had just completed its first decade of operation and needed help upgrading its nursing program. Reluctantly, Faith traveled to Australia for an interview. Back in Chicago, she told her mother that "if they offered me a position I would say 'no.'" But when the phone call came and Faith opened her mouth to say no, to her amazement out came "yes." "I think it's God's leading," she acknowledged. So Faith went to Australia with her mother, who later said that the years in Australia were "the best ten years of her life."

Her success at the University of Sydney brought invitations from other nursing programs throughout Asia. Faith traveled to locations from Korea to New Zealand, bringing her into contact with many different peoples and cultures. Gradually, almost imperceptibly, her own beliefs migrated from the Pentecostal view that salvation comes only through an acceptance of Jesus Christ to the recognition that God loves all of His creation.

Faith decided to retire to Claremont to be near her sister, Anna, who lives at Pilgrim Place with her husband, Jerry Bedford. In another example of God's leading, Faith tells the story of being accosted by a woman on Harrison Avenue. "You should consider Mt. San Antonio Gardens," the woman said. Faith has never seen the woman again, the Gardens had not been on her consideration list, but it all worked out.

At CPC Faith has been an active participant, attending the E-hour and worship and serving as a Deacon. Reflecting on her life, Faith mentioned that age tended to make a person want to do more things for other people. She found her service as Deacon rewarding but frustrating. The parishes are not organized geographically, Faith does not drive, and she found herself unable to travel to people whom she felt might need her. Perhaps, she thought, having two or three people who really need the services of a deacon might be the answer rather than a parish.

In May 2013 Faith underwent surgery for removal of part of her liver which was infected with cancer. Throughout the ordeal people said to her, "You seem so happy." Telling me this story, Faith did not pause to consider the cause of her happiness. Her companions may have been surprised, but Faith

## San Gabriel Presbytery Plans Women's Trip to Peru

The San Gabriel Presbytery has been richly blessed by our partnership with Living Waters for the World and the Synod of Ayacucho in Peru since we began working together in the spring of 2010. We are recruiting a delegation of women from across the presbytery to visit the Synod of Ayacucho in October 2014. The trip will include orientation time in Lima, visits to some of our partner churches, visits to water purification systems that have been installed, a retreat with Peruvian Presbyterian Women from the Synod of Ayacucho, visits to artisans and craft markets, and more. An extension of the trip can be added on to Cuzco and Machu Picchu for those who are interested.

The trip is tentatively set to take place **October 3-13, 2014**. Please be advised that participation in the delegation will require a valid U.S. passport and your vaccinations will need to be up to date. It should also be noted that most of this trip will take place at high elevations, 8500 feet and above, so participants should be in good physical condition and not prone to severe altitude problems.

Space in the delegation is limited. The deadline to submit application materials is **April 15.** Late applications will not be considered.

All applicants must submit a complete application by the deadline of April 15. The cost of the trip, while variable due to variable airfares, is expected to be around \$2000. Please be advised that participants will be expected to contribute to their individual trip costs, as well as raise funds on their own and collectively. Participants will also be expected to interpret their experience to the presbytery both before and after the delegation

Applications forms are available in the church office. We look forward to a powerful experience of relationship building, learning, and partnership in Christian ministry.
