From the Pastor Advent 2013: Wait and Watch

Two words often come up in relation to the liturgical season of Advent: Wait and Watch. We wait for the coming of the Messiah and we watch for the signs that God's ancient promises are being fulfilled. These themes appear in the scripture readings assigned to the Sundays of Advent, "Watch at all times!" and in the lyrics of some of the great Advent hymns, "Watchers, tell us of the Night."

For anyone who has come of age in the last fifty years, "watching" during Advent has an additional meaning. During Advent we literally watch and re-watch our favorite Christmas movies and television specials. *It's a Wonderful Life, A Christmas Story, How the Grinch Stole Christmas, The Santa Clause, A Charlie Brown Christmas* – most of us have at least one movie we just *have* to watch as part of our ritual observance of this season.

Why are these movies so meaningful? Could it be that, though these movies are not overtly "religious" they still portray many of the deep themes of our Advent journey: hope, longing, repentance, transformation, light in the midst of darkness?

This Advent during worship we will place some of our favorite Christmas movies in conversation with some of the great scriptural texts associated with Advent. Perhaps these classic films are a new way that God speaks to us those ancient words of hope and promise.

Bach Magnificat December 22

The *Magnificat* is a musical setting of "Mary's Song" found in Luke. These words have been set in many ways by many different composers - from the medieval era to the 21st century. Bach composed his version in 1723 for a Christmas Vespers in Leipzig where he was the Music Director for St. Thomas Church. Compared to his huge settings of the St. Matthew and St. John passion stories and the Christmas oratorio, the Magnificat is rather brief. But its shorter length in no way takes away from the drama and joy with which he set the text.

*"The musical setting of the Song of Mary (Luke 1:46-55) that Bach worked up during that Advent season 273 years ago is intimate, immediate, dense with musical imagery, achingly tender, startlingly powerful – and unique in the long, long catalog of the man's masterpieces. Literally, yes, unique. Bach never did another piece of music quite like this Magnificat. For one thing, it's dense. In spite of – maybe because of – its small scale, it's packed with intensity, in a way that

his larger choral works couldn't be. And each part of it is short. Each verse is set as a separate musical movement, but none of these are built to any sort of standard pattern or form: there are no da capo arias, no recitatives, and no "big" choruses of the sort that he would have used to open a cantata, for example. Each of the twelve movements is a tiny musical gem whose only purpose is to exhibit, with the utmost conviction, clarity, and vividness, its text."

The work is challenging and exhilarating to sing. The soloists are drawn from the choir and CPC community. The orchestra is made up of Early Music musicians from the greater Los Angeles area. With the exception of the trumpets and oboes, they will be playing on instruments like those Bach would have used.



People in the Church: John and Barbara Anderson

Their enthusiasm is palpable, and you quickly see that they are in love with life, with each other, and happy to be connected with Pilgrim Place and Claremont Presbyterian Church. Their lives intertwined in marriage seventeen years ago. They are a truly remarkable couple.

John speaks first. He had a very successful first career as a librarian, including serving as the director of libraries in San Francisco, Knoxville and Tucson. Yet one evening in Tucson he reflected, "I added up the number of church-related meetings I had attended in a month, representing the Presbytery in a number of areas, and it came to 25. I had to ask myself, why am I doing all this?"

Soon after, he represented the Presbytery at a meeting where Dr. Lloyd Ogilvie was the guest speaker. Ogilvie said something that startled John: "Dare to take on a project that cannot be successful without the direct intervention of God." The words resonated deeply. "I wonder," John pondered, "is there a place for me in the larger church"? It seemed unlikely. He was, after all, a layperson without any seminary experience. Yet soon he saw a notice that the Presbytery of Santa Barbara was seeking an Executive Presbyter and Stated Clerk, and, to his surprise, Ruling Elders as well as clergy were invited to apply.

John was one of four candidates invited for an interview. When he saw the names of the other candidates, he knew not to get his hopes up; they were all experienced Presbytery Executives. "I had served on lots of committees and was Vice Moderator/Moderator-elect, but I didn't have those credentials," he acknowledged. To further dampen his hopes, John learned that he would be the first interviewed, always a bad sign. "After the interview, my wife and I drove to Solvang, had a nice dinner, and returned to our hotel around 10. There was a message waiting: 'You have been selected.' I laughed and laughed and laughed." It seemed Lloyd Ogilvie must have been right.

Later a member of the selection committee told him, "We voted once and found ourselves tied between you and another. So we decided to pray. And after prayer we selected you." He paused, and then added, "Of the four candidates, you were the only one who mentioned God."

John said of those years in Santa Barbara, "I never worked harder and I never loved it more." He went on to represent the Synod of Southern California and Hawaii in a number of national and international activities.

Barbara, who is currently writing a memoir that includes her spiritual formation journey, grew up in the pietistic tradition of the Swedish Evangelical Mission Covenant Church. At a very early age she knew she wanted to be a minister, something that was impossible for a woman in her church. She married a UCC minister, had four children, and then after 17 years endured a divorce. With remarkable resiliency she again took up the dream to be a minister, entering Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary in 1975 and receiving ordination on her 40th birthday as a UCC minister in 1978.

Her life, she says, has been punctuated by a series of significant events. Some might call them coincidences, while Barbara thinks of them as synchronicities. In her final year at the seminary Barbara wanted to explore the practice of spiritual direction. She was unaware of any Protestants in the Chicago area who would encourage her, so she asked her advisor if she could apply to a Catholic Retreat Center. His answer: "Barbara, you're 39, you do whatever you want!" So Barbara called the Cenacle Catholic Retreat Center and was amazed to hear the woman at the other end of the phone say, "Please come. We've been looking for a Protestant to be part of our team." There followed more experiences at a second Catholic retreat center community and at the Church of the Savior in Washington, D.C.

Similarly, when at the end of her studies Barbara considered job opportunities and applied for the position of Campus Minister at the University of Arizona. The call came through that she was one of three finalists, was she still interested in the position? "I had never been to Arizona, at that time it seemed like a foreign country," she confessed. So one morning after the children had gone to school, Barbara went upstairs to pray. In the midst of her prayer, she felt led to return downstairs. There the TV had been left on, and the Today Show announced that they were broadcasting from the Kitt Peak Observatory in Tucson. Coincidence? Synchronicity? Barbara was offered the position. Soon she and her four children were in Tucson. She served for the next four years as Campus Minister.

Barbara has long had a strong interest in mind-body-spirit relationships. While in Tucson she began to wonder if there was a way she could encourage that practice. Into her mind popped the name of Rev. Dr. Granger Westberg, a pioneer in Wholistic Health and founder of the Parish Nurse Ministry. She picked up the phone and called him, a perfect stranger, explained the situation in Tucson, and then heard Dr. Westberg reply, "I've been looking for a way to get to the Southwest." He became the resident theologian for the Department of Family and Community Medicine. Synchronicity? Some people might even say "miracle."

Barbara incorporates the roles of mystic, contemplative, healer and minister as she explores God's connection to us. "I think of God as Spirit, as Presence in our own journey, the Light of the world, bringing us home. That Spirit offers peace and tranquility in the midst of our inevitable ups and downs." To nurture the Spirit within, Barbara regularly meditates, studies, and meets with a spiritual director.

In the early 1980's Barbara became the Associate Pastor of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Tucson, where she served for 15 years. Her church, like many in the Tucson area, found people, many of them Salvadoran refugees, appearing at the door asking for aid. John Fife, another local Presbyterian pastor, became active in the Sanctuary Movement to offer aid and unofficial asylum to refugees. "What can I do?" Barbara asked.

In 1985 she founded Interfaith Community Services, an aid program sponsored by volunteers and Christian, Jewish and Muslim congregations. That program, now with over 60 congregations, 600 plus volunteers and an annual budget over one and a half million dollars, remains a cornerstone of support for needy families in the Tucson metropolitan area. After the attack on the World Trade Center, ICS sponsored interfaith dialogues as well.

Under Barbara's leadership, St. Andrew's became a member of the International Order of St. Luke the Physician, a healing ministry recognized as an extension of regular Christian practice. Barbara made contact with local physicians and began to explore Integrative Medicine. She became the Spiritual Advisor at the Patient Conferences for Integrative Medicine at the University of Arizona College of Medicine, where she worked closely with Dr. Andrew Weil.

Barbara and John connected in 1995, after the death of John's wife. In John's words, "We rapidly fell head over heels in love!" They married in 1996, joining together two families that now contain six children, ten grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren. They share mutual interests that include opera, music, culture, a love of travel, and commitment to family. In addition they

The Andersons came to Pilgrim Place at the urging of Russ Becker. After visiting local churches John and Barbara chose CPC. Barbara noted, "We appreciate the preaching, the music, the ministry to the young, the interfaith connections, and the mission that the church members are faithfully doing." Recognizing the decline in membership among Presbyterians in America, they wonder what will be the future of the church. After attending the recent NEXT Church West conference held at CPC, John hazards a guess that the church as a whole will become more informal and perhaps place more emphasis on small groups.

What is next in their journey? "Now I don't argue theology," John declares. "Love is the answer. My prayers are pretty much just, 'Thank you, God.'" Barbara echoes, "We live with the mystery of God's love and presence."

John continues, in words that should resonate for us all: "At our age, time is precious. When opportunities come along, we have to ask, 'Is this a passion? Is this life-giving?'"
