From the Pastor



Vacation Bible School

This year at Vacation Bible School we will be learning about Athens and the life and work of the Apostle Paul. The children will have the opportunity to imaginatively journey back to Athens and meet Paul who will tell them about his life and his work. They will learn Paul's story, and consider what it means to leave a life of privilege and power in order to spread the news of God's love.

VBS is a wonderful experience that we offer each summer to the children from both the church and local community. At VBS the children who participate are able to experience their faith and to learn more about God's love. Meet Our Newest Members

Ju Koh is from Seoul, South Korea. She came to Claremont last August to pursue a Ph.D. degree in Philosophy of Religion and Theology at Claremont Graduate University. She loves Claremont thus far especially because of the good weather and nice people.

She is from a Presbyterian family, and she had performed many roles at her church in Korea, e.g. Sunday school teacher, weekly young-adult group, newsletter editor, young-adult group worship director, Bible study group leader, a member of a women's quartet, and others.

She is interested in the relation between Christian self and the role of community.

Adele Anderson was born and brought up in Santa Barbara, CA, graduated from Pomona College, and earned a Master's and Ph.D. at Claremont Graduate School. She married Edward F. Anderson (Ted), an Ethno-Botanist and Professor, also a Pomona College graduate

and CGS Ph.D. They lived for 30 years in Walla Walla, Washington where Ted taught at Whitman College and did Ethno-Botany field work in northern Thailand.

While in Walla Walla, Adele taught at various colleges in the area. For eight years, she served on the City Council. She was ordained as an Elder in the Presbyterian Church in the 1960s, served on the Synod General Council of the Alaska Northwest Synod, and served on the national mission board.

Following Ted's interest and opportunities, they have lived in Germany, Ecuador, Malaysia and Thailand.

In 1992, they moved to Phoenix, AZ where Ted was the Senior Research Botanist at the Phoenix Botanical Garden. After Ted's death and 20 years in Phoenix, Adele moved to Claremont in 2012.

Her family includes seven children.

People in the Church: Bill and Pat Reed

Life needs a little confusion, don't you think? Try this. You can subtitle this column "From CPC to CPC." In 2010 Bill and Pat Reed came from CPC (aka Central Presbyterian Church) in Summit, New Jersey, to CPC (aka Claremont Presbyterian Church) in Claremont. Wait, that's not all. They moved to be close to their daughter, Cathy Reed, and son-in-law, Eric Hughson, both tenured professors at CMC (Claremont McKenna College), formerly known as CMC (Claremont Men's College). Are you still with me? OK, let's continue.

Bill and Pat are very active participants at (our) CPC. They regularly attend E-hour programs, worship service, and have been involved in church work projects and a number of different outreach efforts. But they remain members of (that other) CPC where Pat served as an Elder and Bill as a Deacon, continuing some 50 years of membership. Pat is currently active in CLASP, our local after school tutoring program, which reminds her of a very successful tutoring program she and Bill helped from its beginnings in the poverty-stricken Port area of Elizabeth, New Jersey, in the late 1960's. Fondly she remembers Earl, a young black man who had dreams of becoming a professional basketball player. Earl was a problem for the tutors. He wouldn't listen, wouldn't read anything except Sports Illustrated, and he bolted for the door at every opportunity. All the other tutors had thrown up their hands in despair, which is how Earl became Pat's charge. When nothing else worked, Pat finally challenged Earl to a contest of "push-ups," which Pat, to Earl's consternation, easily won. "OK, sit-ups," taunted Pat, and again left Earl in the dust. "I guess you're ok," Earl sheepishly confessed, never realizing that Pat was a P.E. teacher. From that moment Earl and Pat bonded. Earl blossomed and went on to college only to drop out when he was forced to help support his family. Pat later became the supervisor of this tutoring program from 1990 until she left for California in 2010 and Bill served on the Board of Directors of the Elizabethport Presbyterian Center for 40 years.

Both Bill and Pat have very interesting family backgrounds. "The Lord will provide!" was the motto of Bill's father, and according to Bill, "He lived it!" Raised a Christian, Bill's father became a Baha'i, a faith which he found more open to other faiths and more consistent with the life that Jesus practiced and preached. Somehow the Lord (or someone) provided for Bill to attend Oberlin College in Ohio, and that's where he met Pat. Pat was what colleges call a "legacy," since both sets of her grandparents as well as her mother and father were Oberlin graduates. A Physics course at Oberlin excited Bill and determined his future career.

After graduation and marriage, they moved to the Chicago area where Pat taught school while Bill attended Northwestern University, attaining a Ph.D. in Physics. Through what Bill modestly calls a series of fortunate events he was hired in 1961 by Bell Laboratories, at that time the premier research institution in the world for scientists. Over a dozen Nobel laureates have worked there, and seven Nobel prizes have been awarded for

work completed at the Laboratories. Assuming that his work at Bell would be done in a few years, Bill convinced Pat to live in nearby Summit, New Jersey, which at the time was "wealthy, white, and Republican." Bill chuckles when he remembers the local cab driver who proudly responded to a question about living in Summit by announcing that the city council members were "all bankers, CEO's, that sort – men who can't be bothered with a \$5,000 bribe!"

Bell Labs proved Bill wrong about the "few years." He retired from Bell 40 years later, having spent his entire career in the company of some of the most brilliant minds on the planet. When they thought about retiring to the Claremont area, the fact that Claremont is a "college town" greatly appealed to Bill, and they both have been delighted with the array of talents found in our church, the community, and visiting speakers.

"We believe very strongly in the mission outreach of CPC," Bill said. Hip surgery has prevented Bill from volunteering for Living Waters, but he hopes to do so in the future. Pat has been a tutor in CLASP since she first heard about it at CPC. Both have participated in meals for abused women. Our inclusive statement in the church bulletin and our outreach to the gay community have also been important to them.

When the topic shifts to God, Pat acknowledges that she is the product of several generations of Presbyterians. Bill, however, has experienced a profound shift since the days when he was raised as a Baptist and watched his father become a Baha'i. His life as a scientist, improving the lives of millions by painstaking attention to tangible, observable phenomena, subjecting everything to a rigorous scientific method, has had its impact. Looking me in the eye, he states, "I don't believe in God. However I do believe in the church as an instrument of great good and great evil. I believe that CPC is a church that emphasizes the good."

Which leads Bill to declare, "I have an obligation to help others." The Christian ethic, to love your neighbor, to live a life like Jesus, resonates deeply with Bill. In a certain sense, he has retraced the steps of his own father, finding meaning in the ethic while discarding the dogma of religion. It strikes me that Bill's view is similar to that of many young people in our society, and he may be ahead of the curve when we try to ascertain which way religion is heading in America.

At a CPC congregational meeting in April called to review the results of the Listening Project, there emerged the key realization that people felt disconnected from each other and longed for a stronger sense of community. That's when Bill stood up to comment that two years had elapsed and he and Pat had not been able to obtain a church directory. Delight Slotemaker de Bruine jumped out of her seat and dashed to the church office, returning post-haste with a directory. That event highlighted an important issue and prompted me to seek an interview with the Reeds. Is CPC a welcoming church?

Conscientious Projector is a monthly gathering of mindful, passionate people coming together to screen documentaries about important current justice issues, and to discuss these viewpoints from a variety of perspectives. Screenings are free to the public. Screenings in Claremont are at 7:00 p.m. on the third Wednesday of the month at the Claremont Forum, 586 W. First Street (in the old packing house.)

In the film *Genetic Roulette, The Gamble of Our Lives,* "Never-Before-Seen-Evidence" points to genetically engineered foods as a major contributor to rising disease rates in the US population, especially among children. Gastrointestinal disorders, allergies, inflammatory diseases, and infertility are just some of the problems implicated in humans, pets, livestock, and lab animals that eat genetically modified soybeans and corn.

Monsanto's strong arm tactics, the FDA's fraudulent policies, and how the USDA ignores a growing health emergency are also laid bare. This sometimes shocking film may change your diet, protect you and your family, and accelerate the consumer tipping point against genetically modified organisms (GMOs) already underway. Don't miss this film! Wednesday, June 19.
