Creating a Life with God - Focus on Prayer This Lent

In February the American Psychological Association released the results of a recent survey. The survey indicated that Americans are feeling more stress than they did even just six months ago, and that stress levels were the highest they had been in ten years.

A spokesperson for the Association suggested several strategies to help cope with rising stress levels: spending less time engaged in the 24 hour online news cycle, exercising more, or developing a new hobby.

Christians have always found strength for difficult times through being rooted and grounded in prayer and other spiritual practices. These anchors make us more able to withstand the stresses brought about by tumultuous times – and also more able to sustain active, long-term resistance to the evils causing the turmoil around us. Many active Christians, however, say they feel like they really don't know how to pray – or wish they were better at it.

The season of Lent, which begins this year on March 1, is a season to focus on prayer, deepen our current prayer practices, or explore new ones. Our Lenten small groups this year will read together *Creating a Life with God*, by Daniel Wolpert. These groups offer an opportunity to learn more about prayer and how it can anchor our lives and our communities during trying times. Groups will begin meeting on Sunday, March 5. To sign up to be part of a group, cut out the sign-up sheet on page 2 of this newsletter, or call the church office.

Can't join a group? You can still read the book and follow the guide for reading it as an individual. Any of our pastors would be happy to discuss it with you as well.



Looking back on 2016

By proclamation of Pope Francis, 2016 was a Year of Jubilee, in honor of the 50th anniversary of Vatican II. What is the meaning of this gesture on the Pope's part?

In biblical times, once every seven years, debts were to be forgiven, slaves freed, and the land allowed to lie fallow. Furthermore, every 49 years, land that had been alienated from its original owners was to be returned to its families of origin.

The intent of this ancient legislation seems to have been to radically equalize the conditions for life to flourish in terms of the land tenure and productive systems then in place. But whether, and to what extent, such regulations were ever put into practice remains a question, as does what they might mean for us in our very different economic, social, and political conditions.

The very existence of these regulations in the Hebrew scriptures, however, raises a thought-provoking question for all persons of faith: what would happen if, in the spirit of the Jubilee, we were to give serious consideration about how to renew the conditions for life to flourish, not just among the marginal and threatened sectors of our population, but for the land and the creatures as well – all the residents of what the Pope calls "our common home"?

New Theological Seminary of the West

Celtic Spirituality Class and Pilgrimage

This spring, Claremont Presbyterian Church will host a course on Celtic Spirituality taught by The Rev. Dr. Rebecca Pritchard through the New Theological Seminary of the West. The class may be taken for credit or as an active auditor. Next fall, experience a pilgrimage to Scotland to see the landscape and culture out of which Celtic spirituality developed. You may participate in the Pilgrimage without taking the class, or take the class without going on the Pilgrimage.

Class dates/time: April 23, 30; May 7, 14, 21 4:00 - 6:30 p.m.

A revival of interest in Celtic art, history, and culture has led to the rebirth of a spirituality that is rooted in the sacred geography of these Celtic peoples. "New" Celts such as John Philip Newell and John O'Donohue can teach us a spirituality that is creation-centered and embodied, that nurtures connection and community, and that draws wisdom from many sources. In this course, we will consider the writings of some of these New Celts and their ancient roots in pre-Christian times and in medieval Christianity. Spiritual practices inspired by Celtic art and the liturgies of the Iona Community will be part of our time together. The relevance of Celtic spirituality in our present context will be considered.

In Fall 2017, we will travel to Scotland and visit Celtic sites in Edinburgh, Glasgow, and further north. The two-week pilgrimage will include a stay on the Isle of Iona, a center of ancient Celtic Christianity and of the renewal of Celtic Spirituality in our times. The pilgrimage will be limited to twelve participants. Students in the spring course will have priority. A detailed itinerary will be available early in 2017. Dates for the Pilgrimage are the last week of September and the first week of October.
