

May 2013 Do You Hear What We Heard?



We are still sorting through and reflecting on what we heard. Here are some of our preliminary insights:

- 1. People are longing for stronger relationships within our church and wider community. Many of those interviewed lamented that people in our church do not know each other very well. There are pockets of people who have long-standing friendships, but those are the exceptions. Newcomers find it difficult to connect and even people who have been part of CPC for years feel a sense of disconnection. Our relational capital seems to be low.
- 2. Many expressed concern for young adults and young families. Sometimes this took the form of a lament that we don't have more representatives of this group attending CPC. Sometimes this took the form of worry over interviewee's own young adult children and the struggles they are facing in a tough economy. There appears to be a desire to understand the 20 and 30 somethings better and discover ways our church can reach out to them in new ways.
- 3. Unemployment and underemployment was a big concern for many. Some were unemployed themselves, others had close family members struggling, others were working, but in positions below the level of their education and experience.
- 4. No one has enough time. Many, many of those interviewed are frustrated by the pace of contemporary life. Folks observed that nearly every waking moment is scheduled. Many feel they have no time to cultivate important relationships or become involved with issues they feel passionate about. There was some energy to address issues like homework, sports schedules, and other community norms that work against a balanced life.

5. Along with those major themes, other concerns that cropped up often were environmental issues, aging parents, having enough financial resources to retire, growing poverty in our region, the needs of returning veterans, opportunities for more Bible study and spiritual growth, gun violence, and meeting the needs of the vulnerable elderly –especially those who do not live in one of our retirement communities.

What's next? In the coming months, we hope to gather people who shared common concerns – along with others who share those concerns - into strategy groups to consider how best to address these issue. We anticipate that there may be some new projects that start fairly quickly, and some deeper, systemic issues that may take some time to implement.


Sunday Morning at Nine

Summer Surprise

Each summer at CPC we offer an eight-week series to complement the Godly Play curriculum for children grades 1-5. This year our focus for Summer Surprise is prayer. Together the children are going to have many opportunities to engage prayer in multifaceted and creative ways.

We will be exploring prayer in the Bible, and we will talk about the ways in which prayer holds meaning for individuals and for communities. Some of the books we will be using in this series include: Psalms for Young Children, Praying in Color, Images of God for Young Children, Journey to the Heart: Centering Prayer for Children, and Writing to God: Kids' Edition.

Vacation Bible School

This year at Vacation Bible School, June 16-21, we will be learning about Athens and the life and work of the Apostle Paul. The children will have the opportunity to imaginatively journey back to Athens and meet Paul who will tell them about his life and his work. They will learn Paul's story, and consider what it means to leave a life of privilege and power in order to spread the news of God's love.

VBS is a wonderful experience that we offer each summer to the children from both the church and local community where the children who participate are able to experience their faith and to learn more about God's love. We have many activities planned for the children each night including: *Celebration Time* where the children sing, dance and talk about what they are learning together, *The Marketplace* where children do arts and crafts, organized field games, and a drama center where children get to engage actors who are representing people from Paul's community. Each night we also all eat a community meal together, which gives us a special opportunity to fellowship with one another.

Throughout the week, adults from the CPC community will be guiding the children through their activities helping to enrich the experience of VBS for all children. Please consider joining us at VBS this year as this is a community event in which we all come together to enrich the faith experience of the children of our community.

Coloratura soprano, **Kathryn Lillich** is delighted to return to her hometown after four years away at Luther College. Along with her accompanist Janet Noll, Kathryn will offer a program of opera arias, oratorio, and art songs. Come hear "Let the Bright Seraphim" by Handel and other songs by Mozart, Bellini, Richard Strauss, and Dominick Argento. A freewill offering will be received.

Kathryn (Katy) **Lillich** will graduate Magna Cum Laude from Luther College in Decorah, Iowa this May with a BA in Music. She will begin graduate work in Vocal Performance at the Cleveland Institute of Music in Ohio this fall. She began soloing at age seven and has participated in many ensembles in Claremont, including the Claremont Children's Chorale, and Claremont High School Concert Choir, Jazz Choir and Chamber Singers. At CPC, she sang with the

Ms. Noll's accompanying and coaching experience spans thirty-five years, and includes work in the areas of chamber music, solo, vocal and instrumental duo work, choral ensembles, musical theatre and opera productions. She is a solo and duo pianist, harpsichordist, fortepianist, and chamber musician.







Conscientious Projector

onscientious Projector is a monthly gathering of mindful, passionate people coming together to screen documentaries about important current justice issues, and to discuss these viewpoints from a variety of perspectives. Screenings are free to the public. Screenings in Claremont are at 7:00 p.m. on the third Wednesday of the month at the Claremont Forum, 586 W. First Street (in the old packing house.)

Wednesday, May 15 the film to be screened is "Heist: Who Stole the American Dream?" which is stunning audiences across the globe as it traces the worldwide economic collapse to a 1971 secret memo entitled Attack on American Free Enterprise System. Written over 40 years ago by the future Supreme Court Justice Lewis Powell, at the behest of the US Chamber of Commerce, the 6-page memo, a free-market utopian treatise, called for a money-fueled big business makeover of government through corporate control of the media, academia, the pulpit, arts and sciences and destruction of organized labor and consumer protection groups.

But Powell's real "end game" was business control of law and politics. HEIST's step by step detail exposes the systemic implementation of Powell's memo by BOTH U.S. political parties, culminating in the deregulation of industry, outsourcing of jobs and regressive taxation. All of which led us to the global financial crisis of 2008 and the continued dismantling of the American middle class. Today, politics is the playground of the rich and powerful, with no thought given to the hopes and dreams of ordinary Americans. No other film goes as deeply as HEIST in explaining the greatest wealth transfer of our time. Moving beyond the white noise of today's polarizing media, HEIST provides viewers with a clear, concise and fact- based explanation of how we got into this mess, and what we need to do to restore our representative democracy.

Hymn Celebration Sunday - May 19



Sunday May 19 we will celebrate Pentecost with a Hymn Celebration. One of the ways the Holy Spirit has spoken to God's people through the centuries has been through music. In each new generation, the Spirit inspires and calls musicians, writers, singers, and composers to use their gifts in God's service. Experiencing and learning new music is one of the ways the church recognizes and honors the work of the Holy Spirit.

The Presbyterian Church is publishing a new hymnal this fall. The blue hymnal now in our pews was published in 1990 – when Pastor Karen was a newly ordained 25 year-old and Pastor Rocky was a freshman in high school. There has been some water under the bridge – and some wonderful new hymns, songs, and other worship music written in those twenty-three years!

Over the past year, the choir and the Worship and Music Commission have had several opportunities to learn about the new hymnal, sing some of the new material included in it, and consider how it meets our congregation's needs now and in the coming years. In January, our Session approved Worship and Music's recommendation that our church purchase the new Presbyterian Hymnal, *Glory to God.* As when CPC purchased the blue hymnal in 1990, we will again offer church members and friends the opportunity to donate a hymnal in honor or memory of loved ones or friends. A hymnal donation form is included as an insert with this newsletter.

On Pentecost we will sing many of our old favorites and also learn some of the new music that is included in the forthcoming hymnal.
