From the Pastor

In November, the CPC Session appointed an Interim Strategy Team consisting of Kathy Croughan, Kent Miller, and Steve Sittig. This group, in consultation with Pastor Karen, was charged with recommending a staffing plan for this transition period following Pastor Rocky's move to Chicago. During the winter months, Interim Strategy Team members met with youth, the Mission Commission, Children's Center Board, The Deacons, and our Adult Education Forum to gather input. During these listening sessions, we heard a desire for stability for our children and youth as well as a desire for new energy and fresh ideas. We gathered all the contributed information and created two job descriptions: one for a 2/3 time **Interim Associate Pastor** and one for a 1/4 time **Parish Associate for Adult Education and Community Engagement**.

Working with San Gabriel Presbytery, the team began to look for people who would meet our temporary/interim needs. We met with people informally, interviewed formally and to the best of the team's ability, the chosen candidates were, **Krista Wertz**, for Interim Associate Pastor and **Dongwoo Lee** for Parish Associate. Session has approved both the interim staffing job descriptions and our committee's chosen candidates.

In the fall, Session will begin work toward discerning the best way forward for more permanent staffing needs. We will continue to work with the Presbytery's Committee on Ministry. For any permanent, installed pastoral position our congregation will form a Pastor Nominating Committee and conduct a full and open search for candidates. The Interim Strategy team is excited about the work our interim staff will do among us during the coming months.

Krista Wuertz is already well known to our congregation. She began serving as our Director of Children's and Family Ministries in 2010. Krista has a Master of Divinity degree from Princeton Theological Seminary and is completing her Doctoral work at Claremont School of Theology. Prior to her work with us, she has taught at a private elementary school in the San Francisco Bay area and worked as an emergency therapist in Montrose, CO. As our Interim Associate, Krista's work with us will expand to include working with our youth, being the primary pastoral presence with our Children's Center, regular preaching responsibilities, and working with congregational leaders to help us re-envision our work with children, youth and families. Krista is currently

working with the Committee on Ministry of San Gabriel Presbytery to complete her ordination process. We anticipate that she will go before Presbytery to be examined for ordination in September.

Dongwoo Lee is an ordained pastor in the PCUSA and a PhD student at Claremont School of Theology. He was originally ordained by a Presbyterian denomination in South Korea. In Korea he was active in congregation and youth ministries and also served as a military chaplain as part of a South Korean chaplains unit assigned to work with both Korean and American military serving in Korea. Since coming to Southern California, he has worked with New Hope Presbyterian Church in Pasadena and has worked on an Administrative Commission for San Gabriel Presbytery. Dongwoo will work with us shaping our ministries of education and spiritual formation for adults as well as helping us strengthen our relationships with the congregations and mission partners that share our campus. He and his wife live in Claremont.

People in the Church: Bill and Kim Brinegar

What makes you who you are? As a child Kim Brinegar had struggled to learn to read, so much so that her fourth grade teacher declared to Kim's mother that her little girl "would never amount to anything. It would be a waste to send her to college." How devastating those words must have been to a mother, to a child. But there were other voices, people who refused to give up on Kim. Eventually this fourth grade "discard" earned from the University of La Verne a B.A., an M.A., and an Ed.D. At first she elected to teach in Special Education, and you would understand why. Her heart burned with desire to help those with special needs, other children perhaps with undiscovered talents, in danger of being pronounced discards. In 1975 when Alex Hughes, assistant superintendent of Claremont Unified School District and an elder at CPC, hired Kim as a speech therapist, she brought her passion with her. She described Alex as an "earthly angel," noting that at a certain point "you understand that an angel has been placed on your path." Seventeen years later she became principal at Oakmont Elementary School. With its dedicated, talented teachers and support staff, Oakmont could well be one of Claremont's best kept secrets.

"What these children needed most of all was unconditional love," Kim said, and she modeled that for the entire school. Recess every day would find her in the center of the playground, and also in the center of a large group of children basking in her appreciation and care. One day Kim was startled to see Pastor John Najarian striding across the playground toward her. They exchanged hugs and Kim introduced him to the children. John then turned to her and said with a tone both defining and affirming, "Kim, this is your ministry." Their conversation went straight to her heart and stayed there. At times she reminded herself, "Through John O's eyes I saw God's hand placing me at Oakmont and I knew 'why' I am here."

"We never gave up on a child." Kim said that, but so did Bill Brinegar. Like Kim, he earned an Ed.D. and found a fulfilling career as an educator. But Bill has his own story.

"God broke in." That's how Bill described a signal moment in his life. He had just started a new position as Assistant Principal at Ramona Middle School, in La Verne, when one morning his secretary answered the phone and her face went pale. "There's been an accident in front of the school," she said. Rushing to the street, Bill found a student bleeding profusely from massive head injuries. It looked fatal. The boy struggled to get up, unable to comprehend his injuries. At that moment Bill felt an unexpected calmness, and sensed the presence of God: "It's ok, I am here, I will give you strength."

"You know," Bill reflected, "growing up you say your prayers, you read the Bible, you attend church, you go along. And then suddenly one day, it all becomes real. Very real." His frequent prayer now is "give me strength and guide my path."

Recalling that experience has prompted Bill to look back on the rest of his life and discover, as he puts it, "my steps have been guided." "Compelled" might at one point seem a better

word. Or perhaps even "nudged, bumped, pushed, shoved." Bill did not end up where he expected.

Bill grew up in a family of musicians and educators. As a Claremont high schooler, he made two career decisions: 1. Music. 2. NOT education. By his second year of college, however, he realized that others showed more talent. His dreams of a music career dissolved. Curiously unexpected events then happened that moved him, at first against his will and his better judgment, into a career as teacher, Assistant Principal, and Assistant Superintendent of the Bonita School District. "I loved every minute of it."

Few couples have lives more intertwined with CPC. They met as teenagers while Christmas caroling with the CPC youth group. Pastor Jim Angell married them. He baptized their daughter, Kerianne. Associate Pastor Ed Aluzas baptized their son, John. Pastor Sandy Tice married Kerianne and her husband. Now retired, Bill and Kim have turned more of their attention to CPC and its forms of service. "We have received much," they say. "Now we want to give back. There were saints and heroes of the church who were certainly models to us. Now we want to 'pay it forward.'"

In recent years Bill has served three times as a deacon, including Moderator of the Board of Deacons. Kim is now completing her second term as a deacon. Both enthusiastically detailed some of the activities of the deacons. They currently provide backpacks to Oakmont students and hygienic kits to people via Hope Partners. They organize the Alternative Christmas as well as Christmas gifts, including gift food cards, to "adopted families." They staff the post-memorial receptions. In addition they provide a close connection to their parish members, seeking to be, in Bill's words, "the face of Christ to people in your parish." Bill repeatedly praised the dedication and hard work of the deacons as they have expanded their efforts over the years.

At the time of "New Beginnings" in 2014 the deacons expanded the program of delivering chancel flowers to shut-ins, renaming them "Cheer Bouquets." That has become a favorite program of the Brinegars, especially Kim, who manages the chancel flowers. After the service the flowers are divided up and sent out, by deacons and others, to church members and others in the community. Accompanying each bouquet is a card, based on a model provided by Carol Williams' mother, which identifies Claremont Presbyterian Church and says,

"These flowers have heard
the choir sing,
the sermon preached
and the prayers of the people.
And now they come to you!"

Last year some 375 deliveries were made, not including the Christmas poinsettias and Easter lilies. They provide a wonderful opportunity to strengthen caring connections. When her term as a deacon expires next May, Kim will continue the Cheer

Meet Pastor Nova of GPIB

Nova Hidelilo-Winerungan has been the pastor of the GPIB Indonesian Fellowship for four years. Under her leadership the congregation of approximately 50 people has become a member of San Gabriel Presbytery.

Nova grew up in a Christian family on the island of Sulawesi where the majority of the inhabitants are Christian. This is very unusual in this Muslim country. Ever since she was a little girl Nova dreamed of being a pastor even though she only saw male pastors at her church. Now GPIB in Indonesia ordains women. In 1990 Nova graduated from The Christian University of Indonesia in Manado, Sulawesi where she majored in theology. Following graduation she completed a two year internship before she could be ordained. In 1997 Nova became the associate pastor of a large GPIB congregation in Jakarta where she met her husband Martinus Hidelilo whose father was the senior pastor of the church.

After the bank at which he was working went bankrupt in 2005, Martinus came to the United States to work in a factory in New Hampshire that made automobile spare-parts. He learned in Indonesia about this factory because many other

Indonesians worked there. Nova and their two daughters, Angela now 18 and Michele now 17, joined him in 2010. The whole family worked at learning English.

The family moved to California in 2012 when Nova was called to be the pastor of the GPIB Indonesian Fellowship here in Claremont. When Nova was new in New Hampshire she was invited by one of the elders in California to be the pastor of GPIB USA. The members of GPIB are happy that CPC wants to learn more about Indonesia. They know God has called them to witness and serve not only to the Indonesian community but also to all those around them. The leadership of the national church in Indonesia had told the elders to find a Presbyterian Church in California. "You will feel welcome there."

There are many difficulties facing Christian churches in Indonesia where it is hard to get a church officially registered with the government. "Being a Christian is easier here," says Nova. However some things in Indonesia are opening up. The current president of Indonesia is neutral toward religion and the mayor of Jakarta is a Christian.

Day of the Dead Tour

This fall the Community Church of San Miguel de Allende, (where Pastor Karen Sapio served as Visiting Pastor during her 2014 Sabbatical) is once again sponsoring a Day of the Dead Tour. This tour is the congregation's primary fundraiser for the many mission projects this congregation sponsors throughout San Miguel and the surrounding villages. These projects aim to break the cycle of poverty as well as to support projects that provide emergency short term needs to the most destitute in the community.

Cost for the tour is \$1800 per person, (not including airfare)

Included in Tour Price:

- Accommodations in a private home, one bedroom/bath per couple or single guest for 7 nights, with a host watching out for you and assisting you while on tour, as needed.
- Ground transportation from the airport (BJX or QRO) to San Miguel de Allende and back
- Daily light breakfast with hosts and one main meal per day with open bar and entertainment at tour dinners
- Guided Historical walking tour of city
- Visit to rural village outreach project
- Day of the Dead cultural lecture
- Day of the Dead Altar making with cultural guide
- Participation as a Catrina in the Day of the Dead pa-rade
- Live Entertainment and Open Bar at dinner events
- Panteon Visit
