## From the Pastor

*...you will be a blessing* - Stewardship 2014

CPC's Stewardship Team has selected this quote from Genesis 12 as our theme for our Stewardship Campaign for 2014. *The Lord said to Abraham and Sarah, 'Leave your country and your kindred and your parents' house and go to a new place that I will show you. I will bless you .... so that you will be a blessing'*

In last month's *Communicator*, I reflected that Stewardship is really about the flow of blessings in the world. Blessings come to us from God and flow around us and through us to others. Stewardship is about our willingness to be one of the channels through which God's blessings flow into the world.

This story from Genesis also shows that there is a strong connection between the flow of God's blessings in the world and our willingness to take risks and step out toward the unknown. God promises to bless Abraham and Sarah as they leave what is familiar and secure and set out for new place – something they have not seen except in the dreams that God has put into their hearts.

Stewardship is like that too: when we give to the work of the church, it is not the same at all as making an investment with a sure and certain return. It is a way of saying "yes" to God's call to each of us and to all of us to step out in faith toward the dreams that God has put in our hearts; dreams of a community of followers of Jesus Christ that put flesh and bones on the Gospel and live in our community as living blessings.

As you prayerfully consider your pledge to the work of Claremont Presbyterian Church in 2014, embrace the wonderful possibilities of risk and blessing.

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## The Courage and Compassion to Do the Right Thing

*The courage and compassion to do the right thing*. That's a key message that resonates with audiences when they hear author Marty Brounstein talk about his book *Two Among the Righteous Few: A Story of Courage in the Holocaust*. It's a true story of interfaith courage and compassion about a Christian couple in the Netherlands, who despite great risk and danger, help save the lives of two dozen Jews during World War II and the Holocaust. This husband and wife, Frans and Mien Wijnakker, were ordinary people who end up doing extraordinary things.

On Sunday evening, November 17 at 7:00 p.m. members of our local community will have the opportunity to hear this moving tale directly from the author when he speaks at Temple Beth Israel.

"Like Oskar Schindler, Frans and Mien Wijnakker stood up to help in a time period when such courageous actions were few and far between," says Brounstein. "I feel fortunate to be the humble messenger of these two heroes."

The evening is co-sponsored by Temple Beth Israel and Claremont Presbyterian Church – a special interfaith story for a special interfaith event, and it grew out of a chance conversation Brounstein had with TBI member Andy Weissman. The talk is being co-coordinated by Cantor Paul Buch of Temple Beth Israel and Rev. Rocky Supinger of Claremont Presbyterian.

"The fact that I am speaking on this special story is in many respects quite unexpected, for this story is one I stumbled into by accident while on a trip to the Netherlands during May 2009. Little did I know then that this visit would lead me to

one day write a book, being lucky enough to find a publisher for it, and then become as I often say, "An author on a journey with a mission."

Over the past two years, Brounstein has participated in over 200 events in churches, synagogues, schools, bookstores, libraries, Rotary Clubs, workplaces, community centers, book clubs, and people's homes. "My mission has become to keep sharing this story, as audiences and readers have found it to be both educational and inspirational. They have encouraged me to keep telling this story," says Brounstein.

"Many people are often moved by the very *meaningful personal connection* I have to this story," Brounstein continued, "one that has me saying, 'Thank God for the courage and compassion of Franz and Mien Wijnakker.'" Brounstein promises to reveal this personal connection toward the end of his talk.

The entire community is invited to attend.

## People in the Church: Brenda Barham Hill

When she was six years old, Brenda Hill's father suggested to her, "You should think about becoming an engineer." In her mind Brenda silently formed images based on the children's shows she had seen on TV: Captain Kangaroo? Engineer Bob? Engineer . . . Brenda?

At age six, you hesitate to tell your father, especially one who is a career naval officer, that he has somehow lost his marbles. Brenda quietly filed away the suggestion deep within the recesses of her mind. It did not re-emerge until she was in graduate school and had another conversation with her father. "It finally dawned on me what he had meant." It had been her father's dream to become an engineer, and he had hoped to pass it on to her. By then, however, she was well on her way to achieving a Ph.D. in Administration in the area of higher education. Too late! All those fans of Captain Kangaroo will never know what might have been...

But that's another story, one left to the fiction writers. Brenda's father had escaped the poverty of rural Arkansas, where he grew up, by joining the Navy in 1929. December 7, 1941, the day the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor, found him fortunately out at sea aboard the USS Enterprise, en route to Pearl from Wake Island. Among its nicknames, the Enterprise became known as the "Big E" and the "Lucky E," as it was one of only three aircraft carriers commissioned before WWII that survived the war. The Japanese on three separate occasions erroneously announced that they had sunk the Enterprise. But that too is another story.

Brenda grew up as a "Navy brat," born in Oakland and living "all over the place," including Japan and several Southern U.S. states. Returning to California at age 16, she finished high school and enrolled at Occidental College, having a general notion that she wanted to study International Relations. Staggering through two semesters of economics classes [sorry Gordon Douglass, it's not your fault, you were not her instructor] cured her. She jumped ship and landed instead in American Studies. After graduating she gained a Master's degree in Education from Claremont Graduate School and became employed in Student Development at California State University, Bakersfield.

Brenda said she never had a career plan. "I simply wanted to be challenged and to contribute." The position at Bakersfield, however, did not have all the challenges she desired, so by the early 1970's she was back at CGS in the Ph.D. program. Her course of study included an internship at La Verne College, and that's where her career took off. The college liked Brenda, gave her plenty of challenges, including teaching several courses. As her administrative talents emerged, others took notice. In 1979 she became Associate Provost and later Senior Development Officer of the Claremont University Center and Graduate School. From 1986-2000 she served as Vice President of Planning and Research for Scripps College. In 2000 she became the Chief Executive Officer of the Claremont University Consortium, where she served until retiring in 2007.

It was through teaching one course at La Verne College, "Managing Change and Conflict", that Brenda met John Hill, an L.A. County Sheriff. John likes to joke that he had to marry the teacher in order to receive an A. Brenda, however, confides that he never took her class; she met John through the intervention of his supervisor, who was actually the student in her class. They married in 1980 and soon began attending Claremont Presbyterian Church.

John was a "solid Presbyterian" tracing lineage back to his grandparents. For Brenda, it was much more complicated. Brenda's mother had been raised in the Brethren Church in Indiana. On her father's side, her father's grandfather had been a "circuit rider" in the South, preaching "hellfire and brimstone." The result: while Brenda's aunt became a fervent Southern Baptist, her father avoided the inside of a church whenever possible. When Brenda was young her parents would drop her off at the Naval base Sunday School but never enter church themselves. While living in Virginia in the 5<sup>th</sup> grade, Brenda regularly walked to a Presbyterian Sunday School, but left one day when she realized that the church would not allow Communion to those who had not been baptized. Such exclusion seemed terribly wrong to her. The following year, while attending a Methodist church, Brenda went to her "first of several baptism classes." The outcome each time, however, was frustrating. At the end Brenda was always told she would be required to affirm tenets of Christianity that she felt she could not possibly know to be true. The commandment says "Thou shall not lie," so how can you say something is true when you don't know for yourself that it is true?

"Why didn't you have me baptized when I was young?" Brenda at one point asked her parents. "Because," her mother replied, "your father wasn't interested and we Brethren don't believe in infant baptism."

Consequently, despite Brenda's regular attendance and multiple contributions to the life of CPC, she has never been baptized and never joined a church. To insure that their own daughters would not face a similar dilemma Brenda and John had them baptized as infants. She did not want anything to stand in their way of affirming a church like CPC as a valuable, worthy institution for themselves, for the community, and the world. She wanted CPC to nurture their spiritual life, to provide teachings that helped them grow to be good persons, and to become aware of that "part of God in all of us."

For myself I say kudos to Brenda, both for her honesty and for her desire to remove any stumbling blocks that might prevent her daughters, Lauren and Adrienne, from appreciating and cherishing their life in the church. But it raises a question that the church itself often finds difficult to answer: what is our identity? When we are asked the basic question, "do you believe that Jesus Christ is your Lord and Savior," some of us can say "yes" wholeheartedly, others may quietly say, "I believe,

## Conscientious Projector

**C**onscientious Projector is a monthly gathering of mindful, passionate people coming together to screen documentaries about important current justice issues, and to discuss these viewpoints from a variety of perspectives. Screenings are free to the public. Screenings in Claremont are at 7:00 p.m. on the third Wednesday of the month at the Claremont Forum, 586 W. First Street (in the old packing house.) Wednesday, November 20 the film *Cesar's Last Fast* will be screened.

*Cesar's Last Fast* is a multi-platform feature documentary film about the private sacrifice and spiritual conviction behind Cesar Chavez's struggle for the humane treatment of America's farm workers, and the impact Chavez's legacy has on today's generation of organizers fighting for farm worker rights. The film is built around powerful, *never-before-seen* footage of Chavez's 1988 "Fast for Life," a 36-day act of penance for not having done enough to stop growers from spraying pesticides on farm workers. The story of this water-only fast is the film's dramatic arc into which the filmmakers interweave the historic events that defined the life mission of America's most inspiring Latino leader and the struggles confronting today's farm workers.

## Community Meal November 17

**O**ur church is one of seven congregations involved in serving meals three Sundays a month on a rotating basis: Claremont United Church of Christ, Friends Meeting (Quakers), Our Lady of the Assumption Catholic Church, Good Shepherd Lutheran Church, Claremont United Methodist Church, Monte Vista Unitarian-Universalist and Nithyananda V. Temple, Montclair.

As you may remember, this meal program is the response to discussions more than three years ago led by members of the Interfaith Council on the question: "What can local faith communities do to address the needs of the 'homeless' (or financially challenged) in our midst?"

On that date, volunteers are needed to (1) prepare a food item for 20 people and bring it to Summer School by 2:45 p.m. that day or (2) help serve the meal, visit with participants and prepare "to go" boxes.
