From the Pastor


In the twelfth chapter of Genesis God calls Abraham and Sarah from their home and family and sends them into the unknown with this promise: "I will bless you....so that you will be a blessing."

Here, in this foundational story of our faith, is a fundamental principle of how blessing works: it circulates, it flows, it comes from God to us and then moves onward from us into the world. God sums up this promise to Abraham and Sarah by declaring, "Through you will all the families of the earth be blessed."

All our discussions about Stewardship are really conversations about the flow of blessings in the world. God blesses us, and then we bless others so that the flow of blessings can continue to circulate freely. Many of our ministries here at CPC are really ways of opening new channels for the blessings of God to flow into our community and our world. Sometimes we see that flow of blessings rush off in surprising directions. Sometimes those blessings later flow back to us in unexpected ways.

Consider how your new or continued generosity to our church can be part of God's flow of blessings into the world.

People in the Church: Adele Anderson and Ju Koh

dele Anderson and Ju Koh are new members who joined CPC earlier this year. Their brief biographies appear below. Among other new members are Jim and Lenore Brashler. A nice brief biography of them appears in the Pilgrim Place newsletter. The link is http://www.pilgrimplace.org/documents/Bios.pdf.

Adele Anderson

Three words begin with the letter a: Adventure, Adele, Anderson. After interviewing Adele Anderson it may be difficult for me to keep those words separate. With her husband, Edward "Ted" Anderson, she has been in Cambodia in wartime, in Ecuador during two successful coups of government, and lived among headhunters in Burma. The biological parents of three children, she and Ted



adopted four children from Asia as well. While I suspect that an adventurous spirit was already somewhere deep in her genes, the stories she told me began after her marriage to her college sweetheart, Ted, who was pursuing a career as a professor and field botanist. In the late 1950's a Cal Tech professor persuaded Ted, then a graduate student, to study and classify cacti, particularly the peyote, a plant used in Native American religious ceremonies. Mescaline, an extract from the plant, was popularized by Aldous Huxley in *The Doors of Perception* (1954) as a drug of choice for the Beat Generation. Ted became interested not only in the plants but also the native people and their culture, and by the time he received his Ph.D. he was well on the way to becoming an ethnobotanist.

Armed with his Ph.D. Ted accepted a teaching position at Whitman College. That became his base for thirty years. But a field botanist needs to be in the field, so Ted and Adele went to Ecuador as a Fulbright Professor in 1965-66, and to the University of Malaya, Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, in 1969-70. When another sabbatical year approached, Adele asked Ted where he would like to go. "I like the tropics," he replied. Adele recalled that she had recently met Konrad Kingshill at a conference of Presbyterian college presidents. His university, Payap University, in northern Thailand, seemed like a good location. So Adele wrote to Konrad, explaining that she had a Ph.D. in government, Ted had a Ph.D. in botany, and they were willing to teach for a year. Just before she enclosed the letter in an envelope, it occurred to her that her mother might want to come along. So at the bottom of the letter she added that her mother was a pianist who could teach piano. Konrad quickly replied, "We need your mother. You can teach English. Your husband can be attached to the university so he can stay in Thailand."

To understand what happened next you must ask Adele. All I can say is that clearly Thailand and Southeast Asia captured the hearts and interests of the Anderson family. Adele's mother

stayed at Payap University for 13 years. The Andersons returned two more times for an entire year. Ted produced a major work, *Plants and People of the Golden Triangle: Ethnobotany of the Hill Tribes of Northern Thailand* (1993). Adele herself has returned to Thailand twice a year for nearly 30 years. She visits the tribes in Northern Thailand that she and Ted came to know so well. Her many travels and experiences have given her a significant multicultural perspective on events in Southeast Asia and the world.

One evening in Malaysia Adele was just leaving their house when her twelve-year-old son, Clark, asked where she was going. "To a Christmas party at a local orphanage, where there are children who don't have any parents."

Clark mulled this information over in his mind for a moment, and then proposed, "Can we adopt someone?"

"Wait until we get back to Washington," Adele immediately replied. Two years later they adopted Stephen, a Korean child. Eventually the Andersons adopted and brought to America three Asian-American children to join Stephen and the rest of their family.

You know there is much more to this story. I hope this all too brief report will encourage you to seek out Adele and join her circle of friends at CPC.

Ju Koh

Ju Koh grew up in Seoul, South Korea, in a very devout Christian family. Her mother, who served at times as a pastor, had Ju read a chapter of the Bible each day and then discuss with her what she had read. The family prayed regularly. Ju believed that God rules the world, that God loves us and wants us to love each other. But as a teenager Ju found herself "going the other way. I was no longer devout, I



was no longer meek, I fought against religion controlling me too much." She had been an excellent student, but now her grades began to decline. When tragedy befell a high school classmate, Ju found her faith badly shaken. At that point "I disliked God and my parents' teaching. I wanted to care for those for whom even God did not care." Struggling, she felt lost.

One day a highly-respected professor called Ju into his office and addressed her very bluntly, saying, "You have much potential. You should plan to study abroad." Surprised by the man's confidence in her, Ju listened very carefully. He became her mentor. Together they planned the remainder of her studies. With a goal in mind, her grades began to improve again. When she graduated, Harvard Divinity School accepted Ju into its Master of Divinity Program. She was off to America.

Ju found Harvard both "liberating" and "challenging." The (see **Ju** on Page 6)

Conscientious Projector is a monthly gathering of mindful, passionate people coming together to screen documentaries about important current justice issues, and to discuss these viewpoints from a variety of perspectives. Screenings are free to the public. Screenings in Claremont are at 7:00 p.m. on the third Wednesday of the month at the Claremont Forum, 586 W. First Street (in the old packing house.) Wednesday, October 16 the film to be screened is *I AM*.

I AM is an utterly engaging and entertaining non-fiction film that poses two practical and provocative questions: what's wrong with our world, and what can we do to make it better? The filmmaker behind the inquiry is Tom Shadyac, one of Hollywood's leading comedy practitioners and the creative force behind such blockbusters as Ace Ventura, Liar Liar, The Nutty Professor, and Bruce Almighty. However, in I AM, Shadyac steps in front of the camera to recount what happened to him after a cycling accident left him incapacitated, possibly for good. Though he ultimately recovered, he emerged with a new sense of purpose, determined to share his own awakening to his prior life of excess and greed, and to investigate how he as an individual, and we as a race, could improve the way we live and walk in the world.

You may have heard of the African proverb, "It takes a whole village to raise a child." In the work we do, this adage rings true and is dear to our hearts. We are seeking to reach out to our fellow community stakeholders to provide an opportunity in which you can be part of our "village" to further nurture a loving environment for the children we serve and contribute to the welfare of children around the world.

Our vision is to use the proceeds of this event toward creating a natural playground at CPCC, which is environmentally sound and would be functional in all aspects. This specific style of playground provides for an optimal learning environment that will be cherished for years to come.

A portion of the proceeds will also go to "Living Waters for the World," which works to provide clean water to people living in areas of high poverty and low resources around the world. We strongly believe in the idea of a "global village" in helping to raise a child.

High school students return to the center to remember the loving environment they came from and many alumni volunteer to work with the current children because of their fondness for the center. Kaitlyn Peterson, a junior in high school and alumna says this of CPCC, "I still remember how loving all the teachers were. Every time I see one of my of my old teachers, I can't help but think about what an amazing experience I had." Her expression is a testimony of what CPCC is doing to be a part of our village.

courses she took involved liberation theology, feminist theology and post-structuralism. There were many new radical ideas. When she received her Master of Divinity degree, Ju felt she needed some time to reflect upon the ideas that had nearly overwhelmed her. She chose to return to Korea. She appreciated that Harvard had given her a new view of God as the instigator of progressive improvement in the world. There was room in this concept for her to recognize the existence of evil, but not to assume that God had "allowed" it. She felt more comfortable with a feeling that God was inside her and God surrounded her. She could pray to God at any time; in fact, it felt like her life itself became a prayer. However, she felt less comfortable with many of the new ideas that she had encountered. Ju wanted very much to help less fortunate people, not just engage in intellectual discussions of the ideas of intellectuals like Michel Foucault. She decided to stay in Korea and teach English writing during the week and be a volunteer helping others during the weekend.

One day her old mentor asked her to visit. In his office she told him what she was doing and that she was pleased with her path that allowed her to help others. This time her mentor exceeded even his own reputation for bluntness. "Are you crazy?" he shot at her. She was not using the potential, the talent that he knew was hers. He reminded her that God gives us talents and we

have a responsibility to develop and use those talents. The words burned into her. She knew he was right. Soon they were once again planning, this time to enroll in the Ph.D. program in Religion at Claremont Graduate University.

Now in her second year at CGU, Ju seems very happy with her studies. She is focusing on more traditional works, Augustine and Kant among others. She has no car or bike, so she walks most places, including CPC each Sunday for worship. What is next for her? Looming over the fall semester is a personal budget crisis, so she may seek to work in a Korean church to supplement her scholarship. Soon she may begin the process toward ordination in the Presbyterian Church. The future cannot be fully known, but it may include ministry, or academe, or a combination of both. In the meantime she calls her family in Korea each day to hear their voices and assure them that all is well in Claremont.
