
From the Pastor

During our New Beginnings study in 2015, we learned that New Beginnings for congregations often emerge from new connections: from churches following their curiosity and their passions to reach out to people or groups who have not previously been on their church's radar. This month a lot of things are happening at and through CPC that emerged in just that way.

The Labyrinth Festival October 7-9: Murphy Daley's curiosity was sparked when she read about churches using the walking of Labyrinths as a spiritual practice. In a conversation with Karee Galloway, she discovered that Karee had been part of a congregation with a Labyrinth ministry before she moved to Claremont. Together, they reached out to Lars Howlett, whose work is dedicated to helping faith communities, schools and other groups discover this practice. Out of this new connection comes the Labyrinth Festival at Claremont coming to CPC this month. You can read more about it in this newsletter.

Our Refugee Concerns Team has been forging new connections with churches and individuals in the Claremont/Pomona area who are working on responses to the Syrian Refugee Crisis. These new connections led to our sanctuary being the host site for A Benefit Concert for Refugees this October 22. We anticipate several hundred guests on our campus that night.

CPC Deacon Sally Lopez attended a performance of The California Baptist Male Chorale at the invitation of a friend. She was so moved and impressed, she knew she wanted Claremont to have a chance to hear this remarkable ensemble. She approached the Evangelism and Nurture Commission to see if CPC would sponsor a concert as part of our Performing Arts program. That event is scheduled for Sunday, October 30.



Congregational Gathering



People in the Church: The Prayer Chain

On August 27 CPC held a memorial service for long-time member Marilyn Hamilton. Among the small group in attendance was her grandson, Peter O'Connell. We at CPC are grateful for her signal effort in creating the CPC Prayer Chain, an act which today deserves continued recognition. The following article appeared in the Communicator in 2010 and has been slightly updated. Thanks again, Marilyn, for the Prayer Chain.

Peter O'Connell's scream pierced the night. The young boy had "brittle bone disease," and another bone had just snapped. His grandmother, Marilyn Hamilton, felt a knife of pain shoot through her. "I felt so helpless," she said. "I needed to do something." A few days later she got the Presbyterian Women to organize a prayer chain similar to the ones she had known in other churches. That was over fifteen years ago.

The CPC Prayer Chain, composed of twenty women, continues today. Carolyn Knight became the leader in the early years and faithfully performed that responsibility until recently, when it passed to Phyllis DeLeo and now (2016) Joyce Alexander.

How does it work? Often a person may call one of the pastors (624-9693) or [Joyce Alexander 909-621-0493] and request prayers for themselves or someone else. In all cases the information is confidential and Joyce checks with the person to see what information she can share with the Prayer Chain and to make sure they want prayers. The group relies on a telephone tree. Joyce contacts three people, who each contact three others, until all twenty are notified. Members are given a name and sometimes additional information.

I was especially curious to know what people in the Prayer Chain prayed for. In our society we know that some people pray for money, some pray for miracles. Often they seem to be saying that God ought to do what we want, instead of us following God's will. In the case of my own illness (myasthenia gravis) that began in 2008 I found myself unsure what to pray. If the illness was God's will, or even more, if it was somehow a "gift" from God, to me or someone else, wouldn't I be wrong to pray that the illness be taken away, that a cure would occur? On the other hand, it seemed too much, at least in the beginning, to offer prayers of gratitude for these times of trauma and crisis. Is there some wisdom we might gain from the Prayer Chain?

I discovered that what and how Prayer Chain members pray is left to their own discretion. "I pray that God bless the person. I pray that God's will be done," said Leonaine Dixon. "If it's an upcoming surgery," said Marjorie Stoddard, "I often pray that the person be at peace. And I pray that the physicians have a good night's sleep." Phyllis DeLeo prays that the person feels

surrounded by God's loving, healing presence. Her prayers are not just for physical healing, but emotional and spiritual healing as well. Marilyn Hamilton said, "I pray that people know they are not alone, that they know they are loved, that they are in the good hands of a loving God." What if it involves a terminal illness? Pat Beswick said, "I pray 'God, don't let this person suffer.' I pray that there is somebody to be with them." And if there are times when it seems appropriate Pat will pray "that you and your family know that this is a gift." In the midst of the traumas and the tragedies, their vision of a loving God comes through so powerfully in these prayers.

For the people I interviewed, these prayers were not tasks or obligations. Their prayer lives strengthened their own connection to God. At a time when Marilyn Hamilton felt helpless to stop Peter's illness and pain, she could turn to God in prayer and know that she and God together could be of help. "It brings me closer to God's reality and the importance of faith in our lives," remarked Leonaine Dixon. Marj Stoddard spoke of having "a feeling that I am supported." Phyllis DeLeo told me that prayer provides a vital connection between us, and between us and God. "We are spiritual beings," she declared. "To deny that, to deny prayer, is to lose sight of who we really are."

Is the Prayer Chain well used by our congregation? There are dry spells and there are floods. I got the sense that we averaged 3-4 requests per week. That had Marjorie Stoddard wondering, "How many people avail themselves of the Prayer Chain?" Do most of us know it exists? Are we embarrassed to request prayers for ourselves? Does it ever occur to us that our request might help others connect to God? Most of the requests are health-related and come at a time of crisis. Imagine how many more of us might seek prayers for spiritual help. Remember the man who told Jesus, "Lord, I believe. Help my unbelief."

In my own case, I never quite resolved the question of what I should pray for, and yet by the time I was one year into the illness I seemed to be emotionally and spiritually at the place desired by the Prayer Chain people. Does that sound like prayer is working?



Living Waters for the World

On September 13, Claremont Presbyterian Church launched Veronica Hernandez and Judy Kohnen from Claremont, to the highland Andes of Peru. The team joins five other members from the San Gabriel Presbytery (Wendy Gist, Rob Crowell, Pat Martinez-Miller, Bob and Debbie Cowan.) Judy and Veronica work together, providing educational health training at two new Living Waters for the World (LWW) water purification systems located in Huanta and Yanama. The government brings piped water to its population, but poor infrastructure and maintenance issues mean that over 80% of the population has water-borne hepatitis A and B, from agricultural and human contaminates seeping into the water lines. This is why the systems are needed.

Our September installations are in the highland Andes area, in the province of Ayacucho. The project in Huanta is an elementary school with 300 students. Judy and Veronica provide all the instructional materials, show the teachers how to use it, and then spend a day watching the teachers teach a classroom of children the LWW curriculum. Huanta is a rural town but the second site, Yanama, is a huge slum, in the city of Ayacucho. The slum is divided into districts. We previously installed a system in district 13, but it had been moved to district 7, and they need a refresher class on system maintenance and educational training.

The Living Waters initiative in Peru is growing; there are installations by other groups in other highland cites like Arequipe, Cusco, as well as a jungle systems in Iquito. For the first time, Living Waters is sponsoring members from all these places, a few Americans but all the Peruvian installment leaders and partners. Locally, the Peruvians need to make it convenient to pick-up the water, and figure out how to price the water so that there is money to pay for new water bottles and for someone to run the system.

This is the latest news. And there is momentum. Rotary International has funded fifteen more sites, schools and orphanages, all in Lima. We will be scoping potential locations, and expect some of these to be ready in the Spring 2017, Irene Atwood is already on stand-by for that trip.

Of course, this work stands on the shoulders of other Claremont and San Gabriel team members who coordinate behind the scenes and have done five previous installations. Irene Atwood did all the shopping for this trip. Octavio Guerrero figures out funding. Roger Denton is a powerful fundraising worker. Sam Atwood, Will Kohnen, and many, many hands in our congregation continue to make this mighty undertaking a little easier.
